

New Opportunities to Advance Positive Youth Development (PYD)

GSDI is part of a consortium that has been awarded the Youth Power 2 Learning and Evaluation (YP2LE) grant. The consortium is led by Making Cents International. The grant is designed to support USAID's Youth in Development Policy by enabling investments in Positive Youth Development (PYD) research and evaluation within and across multiple sectors. PYD engages youth along with their families, communities, and governments to build skills, assets, and competencies; foster healthy relationships; strengthen the environment; and transform systems. Through this grant, the consortium will provide PYD evidence, facilitate knowledge transfer, build capacity of in-country stakeholders to develop high-quality, impactful, and sustainable youth programs to achieve systems change.

An Evaluation of a School-Based Savings Program and Its Effect on Sexual Risk Behaviors and Victimization Among Young Ghanaians

Key Finding: Participation in a school-based savings program had a positive effect on sexual risk-taking and victimization among sexually-experienced youth, compared to sexually-experienced youth in the marketing outreach and control groups.
